2024	Deputy DA Melissa LeRitz	Poaching, wildlife trafficking, and other wildlife crimes negatively affect wildlife species populations, the livelihoods of people that depend on wildlife for food security, and biological diversity across the landscape. In addition to harming species through population losses, wildlife overexploitation can cause long term ecological problems such as creating sex-ratio imbalances and slowing the reproduction rate of vulnerable species (2019 UNODC). Through the cases she prosecutes, DDA LeRitz holds poachers accountable for their actions and sends a message that poaching will not be tolerated in Oregon and there are real consequences for committing wildlife crimes. The fact that she has been named Wildlife Prosecutor of the Year by OSP Fish & Wildlife Division twice indicates that her participation in holding poachers accountable has made lasting positive impacts towards wildlife conservation. DDA LeRitz is deserving of this award because she recognizes that wildlife belongs to all of us in Oregon, and she takes action to ensure that when hunting laws are broken, it affects us all.
